So I saw that there is nothing better than that all should enjoy their work, for that is their lot; who can bring them to see what will be after them?

The 206th Annual Diocesan Convention will be held November 18-19, 2022 in Cleveland, Ohio at the Cleveland Marriott Downtown at Key Tower.

The Episcopal Address and all business will be on Saturday, November 19, at the Cleveland Marriott Downtown at Key Tower. Details regarding the Friday schedule will be shared once finalized. Registration will open in the early fall. Anyone attending any portion must register by October 28.

The Annual Convention of the Diocese of Ohio is the legislative body that approves the diocesan program and budget, elects persons to various groups, which serve the diocese, adopts resolutions on various issues, and approves changes in the Constitution and Canons of the diocese.

Each congregation in union with the convention, that is, those that are current with payment of diocesan assessments and Church pension requirements, is entitled to be represented by not more than three lay adult delegates in good standing in their respective congregations. Delegates are chosen in accordance with the prescribed Canon, or by special parochial charter or bylaws of the parish. When not a virtual convention, attendance at Annual Convention is not limited to lay delegates and clergy. Youth and adult members of all congregations are welcome and encouraged to attend, epically sitting wardens and Vestry members.

Lincoln School

Let me begin by sharing information gathered from "Second Helpings" the publication of Second Harvest Food Bank. Second Harvest relies on donations from local manufacturers, retailers, wholesalers and farmers. Those donations are down by at least 27%. The largest supplier of food is the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the commodities they normally receive from the USDA are down almost 60%. Pair this with inflation, rising food costs, ongoing supply chain issues and increased fuel costs, then add in increased demand for food assistance and you have a nightmare of a situation. Second Harvest is now purchasing more food than ever before but there is no guarantee their order will be received.

Resources are shrinking for families who are food insecure.

At last week's Lincoln School visit I had the opportunity for the first time this school year to have a conversation with the Community Liaison. School has been in session now for about a month. The kids had an easier time this year than last settling in. What has not changed are the needs for life's essentials - food, shelter and clothing. We cannot provide shelter we can provide some relief for lack of food and clothing. The needs have grown - now EVERY Friday since the start of school 200 emergency food bags are distributed. I was told that once the bags are distributed the Pantry is bare. The Community Liaison apologized for keeping me waiting. He was at the Pantry helping a student find clothing. Unfortunately, there was none that fit her. Cold weather is coming and with it the need for warm clothing.

Children Needs:

Emergency Food Bags - peanut butter, jelly, chicken ramen noodles, mac and cheese, SpaghettiOs/etc. and fruit cups are needed.

Clothing: Leggings and Sweatpants sizes 5 thru 16 plus winter jackets are needed for both boys and girls. New and gently used and washed items are greatly appreciated.

Warren Family Mission

As at Lincoln School the Mission is feeling the impact of inflation and changes in community support at a time when the needs of people are increasing.

The Mission continues to distribute lunch and dinner at the Tod Avenue location Monday thru Friday from 12 Noon to 12:30 PM

The Mission's Winter Coat drive is scheduled for October 14th from 1 to 3 PM. Coats Hats Gloves Scarves Blankets are being collected through October 10th at the Mission at 155 Todd Avenue NW.

There remains a continued need for all kinds of non-perishable foods, personal hygiene items and new and gently used and washed clothing of all sizes for boys, girls, men and women.

I keep thinking these needs are overwhelming but then I am reminded that "Little Becomes Much in the MASTER'S Hands". Our gifts feed and clothe those in need.


